**A walk in the Downs to a Pulpit
with a Panoramic view**

Molash to Perry Wood 7.5 miles (12Km)



The village of Molash is situated in the North Downs, AONB. The 13th century St. Peter's church features attractive stained glass windows and a Norman font. The yew trees in the churchyard are over two thousand years old.

The walk passes through the rolling green pastures of the 4,500 acre Lees Court Estate, which is considered to be one of the finest in Kent.

Perry Wood spans 150 acres. This woodland encompasses a wealth of footpaths, and is abundant with wildlife and glorious rhododendrons. The Mount offers panoramic views of the Kent countryside and coast. The woodland is home to many rare birds, including treecreepers, nuthatches and woodpeckers.
