
This walk is for all ages; at least one person should be proficient at map and compass reading.

A Woodland Wander in the Heart of the Blean

Dunkirk to Blean circuit 8 miles(13Km)




The Blean is the largest expanse of ancient broadleaved woodland in England, it spans more than eleven square miles. The woodland has been tended by local folk for more than one thousand years, this work is maintained today by woodsmen and conservation teams.

A large part of this unique landscape is a designated National Nature Reserve which is abundant in wildlife. There is a wide accessible network of paths through the woodland and there are sections where dogs, horses and cycles are not permitted.

The village of Dunkirk was once a place of sanctuary for petty criminals and smugglers. The oldest buildings in the village today date back to the 18th century. It earned its place in history because of the Battle of Bossenden Wood, the last armed rising in Britain during the time of the Tolpuddle Martyrs..

This walk follows some woodland paths and tracks that are not marked on the Ordnance survey Explorer maps for the area. Please ensure that you follow the correct paths at the junctions there are paths that are not on any maps. Take care between the yellow triangles on the map ensuring you stay on the pavement.
